The birth of the art of navigation is said to have taken place around 3500 B.C. Usually they traveled by day and sought a calm harbor or anchorage at night. One of the earliest man-made navigation tools was the mariner's compass, an early form of the magnetic compass. Initially used only when the weather obscured the sun or the North Star. These first compasses were very crude. Early mariners found the compass inconsistent - most likely because they did not understand that it pointed to the magnetic north pole, not true north. Today's modern cruise ships are equipped with a multitude of high tech devices to keep their course as they trek across the globe to exotic ports of call.
